Board approves Development Agreement for Forked River Commons Outparcel 3

The Millington Board of Mayor and Aldermen has unanimously approved a non-residential Development Agreement for Outparcel No. 3 in the Forked River Commons shopping center.

Board members took the action during their March 11 regular monthly meeting on a motion offered by Alderman Bethany Huffman and seconded by Alderman Mike Caruthers.

BRG Development Partners owns a 1.79-acre tract zoned PD, Planned Development, in front of the shopping center that the company will develop into a three-bay commercial building.

At two regular meetings last fall, the Millington Planning Commission separately approved the Site Plan and design submitted for the outparcel building.

A bond amount of \$13,568 was approved by the commission at its March 18 meeting.

The outparcel is on the west side of Highway 51 and north of where the LongHorn Steakhouse restaurant will be located.

At the commission's October 2023 meeting, City Planner Nathaniel McHaffie noted that the building will be slightly more than 10,000 square feet, with a drive-through on the south end of it. An ATM will be located on the back of the site.

While 50 parking spaces are required, McHaffie said there

will be 74, with four "van-accessible" spaces.

Although the seven "queuing spaces" in the drive-through will exceed the city's requirements, he noted that queuing had not been marked for the ATM.

McHaffie said stormwater detention for this outparcel is "already handled" by the main shopping center development.

The commission approved the Site Plan with the following conditions:

(1) A photometric Site Plan must be provided that does not exceed 5 foot-candles.

(2) The ATM queuing must be striped for at least three cars.

(3) Yellow-detectable surfaces that comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act must be provided on the handicapped ramps.

(4) Location of the irrigation water tap must be shown on the Utility Plan.

At the commission's December 2023 meeting, McHaffie said the building will consist of the Exterior Insulation Finishing System, which is artificial plaster

He noted that the EIFS part will be an off-white color, and the bottom 3 feet of the building will be a gray brick façade.

McHaffie also said there will be a red "accent" awning for the middle tenant that is compatible with the city's Design Guidelines.

The rear and east elevation will be block on the rear wall.

Signage will have to be approved separately.

renkle knocked in Harrison with a single to make the score 1-1.


TRA took the lead for good when Neely Grantham smacked a base hit to score Sprenkle. Lanie Howe singled in two runners to make the tally 4-1.

Tale of Two Games

Lady Trojans dominated four innings of action, Munford's three terrific innings good enough for win

Normally when a team scores 15 runs and holds a 12-3 advantage at one point of a softball game, that head coach leaves the field satisfied and victorious.

Millington Lady Trojan Skipper Kasey Craddock exited her home field Thursday night puzzled because rival and now district foe the Munford Lady Cougars earned a 22-15 victory with 19-0 run at one stretch.

"They just picked up on our pitching, even when we changed it," Craddock noted. "They scored a few and got momentum. We made some major errors and then they were hitting them where we couldn't catch them with people on base.

"It was definitely the perfect storm," she added. "We had pitch charts and

all of that. They were just seeing it."
Millington was seeing Munford pitching well in the early innings grabbing a 3-2 lead in the first inning. Lady Trojan Riley Washburn had a RBI double and Shelby Pindell singled in the go-ahead run.

The Lady Trojans surged ahead 5-2 in the second inning featuring a Kaleigh Wilston RBI base hit.

After the Lady Cougars stretched out a run in the top of the third, Millington put together another three-run frame. Breanna Hulsey drove in a pair of runners with a single.

Then the Lady Trojans seemed to put the game away in the fourth inning with four runs highlighted by a Grace Bell RBI triple off the wall. The Lady Cougars faced a 12-3 deficit heading into the fifth inning and a crossroad.

"Yesterday we had, I don't want to say a 'Come to Jesus' meeting, I think it all came together at practice yesterday," Munford Head Coach Raygan Huffman said. "We had a practice before we were supposed to play Raleigh-Egypt. We were on a losing streak. I was like 'This is not Munford

"I think they were tired of it," she added. "They had the fight in them. I told them, 'You can either shut down and go home. Or we can come back and finish it. Tonight they finally finished and I think Munford Softball is back on track."

Getting back on track against Millington started with Gracie Williams driving in a run with a bases loaded single. The fifth inning concluded with the score 12-6.

Then Munford exploded for six runs in the sixth inning to deadlock the game at 12-12. Williams was the star once again.

Facing another bases load at bat, the freshman hit her second homer of the season to tie the game.

"I think tonight is the turning point because this coming up week, there's no turning back now," Huffman said. "They have to keep the feeling of what they just did in their minds and know that a comeback is always possible."

Munford completed the comeback with 10 runs in the top of the seventh inning to make the score 22-12. Millington displayed some grit scoring three runs in the seventh to make the final tally 22-15.

'Kasey is going to make a program and they are a scrappy team," Huffman said. "They hit the ball well. My pitchers have to hit some spots and we can't be having errors in the field. I think if we cut a lot of that out we both cut down the score a lot. Millington is a scrappy team and they'll be on the come up for sure. They're a team to look out for."

Craddock took a positive from the seven-run loss for her team as well.

"Building from last year, we got runruled twice," she recalled. "We only scored one run on them before. We came in tonight and had a chance to pull away with it. I think it added fuel to their fire.

'They're defeated because they hate to lose," Craddock concluded. "But they're not defeated because they are excited to see what I've been telling them they could do."

Lady Trojans building offensive chemistry against White Station

Millington Lady Trojans Head Softball Coach Kasey Craddock was excited around February about the start of the 2024 season.

Fast forward to March 26, the Lady Trojans entered the day with only three games on the record. After picking up a win over district opponent Raleigh-Egypt to begin the day, Millington pulled out the welcome mat for the White Station Lady Spartans to get some reps.

"Season has been going good but slow," Craddock acknowledged. "We've got rained out a couple of times. I feel like we're behind because we hav-

en't played a lot.

"I feel like we're behind but we're learning," she continued. "I think it actually has been pretty good because we've been learning. We've had more practice time. Time to figure things out."

The Lady Trojans figured things out against White Station only leading 2-0 after two innings. With a couple of adjustments, Millington used a 13-run rally to end the game with the Lady Spartans 15-0 in three innings.

"We had to adjust at the plate," Craddock said. "Their pitcher was throwing pretty good but it's a little slower than what we're used to. The first inning we were kind of slow at the plate.

"That's what we've been talking about adjusting, either to the umpire or to the pitcher," she continued. "The young ones are making good strides.'

One of the young ones in





the lineup is Jade Fowler. The eighth grader bats leadoff and kept the Millington rally flowing in the third inning.

Lady Trojan starting pitcher Riley Washburn began the frame with a walk. Then Hayley Stevens struck a double. Kaleigh Wilston drove in Washburn with a base hit to make the score 3-0.

After Madalin Dotson drew a walk, senior outfielder Shelby Pindell crushed a double to center field to make the tally 6-0.

Rilee Ervin came up in the nine-spot and singled. Fowler was up next and drove a base hit through the White Station defense for an RBI.

After Grace Bell walked, Breanna Husley reached on an error and two runs crossed the plate to make the score 9-0. Washburn's sacrifice fly made the tally 10-0.

Freshman Hayley Stevens kept up the pace with another hit in the frame. Her single made the score 11-0.


Wilston singled again and Dotson reached base once again with a walk. Pindell drove the ball to the wall but the catch limited her to a sacrifice fly making the tally 12-0.

Ervin made the score 14-0 with a base hit and Fowler ended the game with a fielder's choice RBI.

Shelby County Department of Housing will hold a public hearing to discuss Shelby Shelby County Department of Housing (SCDH) has prepared a draft of the Federal 5-Year Consolidated Plan for Shelby County Fiscal Years 2025-2029 and Annual Action Plan for Fiscal Year 2025 (July 1 2024-June 30, 2025). The Annual Action Plan for FY2025 (HUD Program Year 2024) is required by the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for the receipt of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) Grant Entitlement funds. The Proposed Annual Action Plan describes activities proposed by SCDH to address housing and community development needs, especially needs in low- to moderate- income areas of Shelby County outside of the City of Memphis.

The proposed 5-year Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plan for FY25 will be available for public review from April 10, 2024 – May 10, 2024. The plans will be made available online at www.develop901.com/housing and physical copies will be held at 6465 Mullins Station Rd, Memphis TN 38134 and at the following library branches across Shelby County: Benjamin Hooks Central Library, Arlington Library, Bartlett Library, Collierville Library, Germantown Library and Millington Library. SCDH will hold a public hearing to discuss the proposed plans, amendments and updated joint Equity Plan to address fair housing needs with both in person and virtual attendance options on April 22, 2024 at 12:00pm and 5:30pm.

Attendees should enter the Code Enforcement Building through the Training Room entrance; upon walking up to the building, attendees will need to follow the signage that leads to the Training Room.

The consolidated planning process for FY 2025-2029 serves as the framework for a community-wide dialogue to identify housing and community development priorities that align and focus funding from the CPD formula block grant programs Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) Programs. The FY 2025 Annual Action Plan establishes the basis for the use of entitlement funds for the period of July 1, 2024 – June 30, 2025. The primary purpose of this hearing is to receive comments on the proposed FY 2025-2029 Consolidated Plan as well as for the FY 2025 Annual Action Plan during the public comment period. Shelby County anticipates receiving level funding for the upcoming program year; \$1,169,819.00 in CDBG and \$472,756.00 in HOME funds in Program Year 2024/Fiscal Year 2025. If these anticipated resources differ from actual 2024 allocations, SCDH proposes adjusting funding for each activity either up or down according to the following order of priority: 1- Housing Rehabilitation and Minor Home Repair, 2- Community Development Projects responsive to high priority non-housing community development needs, and 3- Public Service Activities.

Shelby County expects to submit the Consolidated Plan for FY 2025-2029 and the Annual Plan for FY 2025 to HUD on or before May 15, 2024 following a 30 day review and comment period April 10, 2024 through May 10, 2024. Note that there is currently a delay in HUD's allocation announcements, and the plans will be submitted to HUD within 60 days following the actual allocation announcement. In addition to the Consolidated Five-Year and Annual Action Plans, the Department of Housing will provide the results of the updated Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice: A joint Equity Plan to address housing needs to address disparities in access to affordable, quality housing. The hearing will also provide an update on current activities under the CDBG and HOME Programs including HOME-ARP, information on Section 3 contracting opportunities; and will provide information on other programs operated by the Department of Housing.

In accordance with section 218(g) of the Appropriations Bill 42 USC 12748(g), SCDH is reprogramming the 2018-2021 HOME Community Housing Development Organization (CHDO) setaside funds to increase the amount available for homeowner rehabilitation in the amount of \$244,758.15. This amends the 2015-2019 and 2020-2024 Consolidated Plans. In addition, after June 30, 2024 SCDH will reprogram PY2024/FY2025 CHDO funds in the amount of \$71,860.95 to increase the budget available to homeowner rehabilitation.





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
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ALONG THE JOURNEY

All across our world today, many of the world's religions find themselves in the midst of a most important "holy" season. Islam/Ramadan, Judaism/Passover, Christianity/Holy k-Easter, and ves there are others. They coincid nificant events, beginnings of new years, springtime and new birth or re-birth ... it is indeed a time for reflection and affirmation by many faiths and people. Yet, if we look to the newsmakers of our world's headlines ... we will be inundated by issues of power, greed, scapegoating, famine, abuse, mis-information and much more. Indeed it is a sad state of affairs we find ourselves in as writers of the history of our day!

Human nature, when seeking power, wants either to play the victim or to create victims of others. In fact, the second follows from the first. Once we start feeling sorry for ourselves, we will soon find someone else to blame, accuse, or attack ... and often with impunity! It settles the dust quickly, and takes away any immediate shame, guilt, or anxiety. In other words, it works ...

When we read today's news, we realize the pattern has not changed much in all of history. Hating, fearing, or diminishing someone else holds us together for some reason. Scapegoating, or the creating of victims, is in our hard wiring. It has been said, "the scapegoat mechanism" is the central pattern for the creation and maintenance of cultures worldwide since the beginning.

The sequence, without being too clever, goes something like this: we compare, we copy, we compete, we conflict, we conspire, we condemn, and we crucify. If we do not recognize some variation of this pattern within ourselves and put an end to it early on, it is almost inevitable. That is why spiritual teachers of any depth will always teach simplicity of lifestyle and freedom from the competitive power games, which is where it all begins. It is probably the only way out of the cycle of violence.

It is hard for us religious people to hear, but the most persistent violence in human history has been the violence "we" have treated as sacred, but which was, in fact, not. Humankind has found a most effective way to legitimate their instinct toward fear and hatred. They imagine they are fearing and hating on behalf of something holy or noble: their God, their religion, their truth, their morality, their children, or their love of country. It takes away all guilt, and one can even think of oneself as representing the moral high ground or being responsible and prudent as a result. Is not this what we see in the actions of the Sanhedrin, along with the High Priest in their taking Jesus before Pilot and the forcing of his condemnation unto death. It never occurs to most people that they are becoming what they

But thanks should come and grow within us (especially in this season) that the Christ walked willingly into a human world defined ... as it still is today ... by violence and dependence on scapegoats. He was crucified not because the Creator wished for or needed his sacrificial death but because as humans, when the stakes are high, we determine who is in and who is out through violence and death.

Jesus ... broke the system because what was supposed to happen

The scapegoat did not stay dead and the victors, in this case, did not get to write the only version of the story. The scapegoat came back to life and told a different story, a story of God's love and desire for "us" to have "life more abundantly." Likewise the perceived "scapegoat" has asked us to become the tellers of the story for future generations "Go and be my witnesses ..." in your journey ...


"My mom works all the time and my dad always brought me to my games," Eli recalled. "She would be at work watching me.

"She always pushed me to be better and better," Eli said. "I used to think of her being my athletic role model, but I would push myself to be better than her."

Alton noted the sibling pair had a healthy rivalry despite a four year age

gap. "Even though they're so far apart in age, there was always competition," he said. "He would get onto her if he saw her not doing something he thought she should do. He wanted her

to be aggressive. "Then she would say, 'I did this. I did that. How many home runs did you have? I had this," Alton added. "It was always a back and forth. They fuel

each other and they still do

it until this day."

Like Abby, Eli celebrated a signing day on the TRA Campus. Johnie Sanfratello had the honors of speaking on the career of the elder West back in 2019.

Fast forward to 2024, TRA Head Baseball Coach Jacob Cole reflected on the stellar career of Eli.

Cole said West will be among the Rebel Baseball pitching greats like David Owen, Connor Alexander, Patrick Green, Corey Mitson, Zach Seward and Gil

Erwin. "I was looking at his number preparing for to-day, he's on pace to be in the top three in everything," Cole said. "I don't think he's going to touch Mitson's K record, but he's like 50 away from be-

ing second on that list.

"He's a hard worker and competitor," he added. "He's been like that since eighth grade, which was the COVID year. We really didn't get to see him much his eighth grade year. Comes out his freshman year and makes an impact almost immediate-

West developed a weapon on the mound that gave his coaches confidence and reassured his mother.

"Definitely my fast ball," Eli noted "I like throwing the fast ball to make people hit it. I've

been clocked at 91 mph." Cole said West has the stuff to go back to State before he heads north to

FHU. "Just do what he does," Cole said. "He's going to go out there and compete.

He's going to have the ball

Visitors to the Millington Public Library will see a multi-facet panel with facts, information, photos and other historical tidbits. Learn about the schools in the area, like the successful learning institution modeled on the Booker T. Washington plan like Woodstock Demonstration School.

Woodstock was the teaching home of Ida B. Wells before she became a pillar in journalism.

George Washington Carver came and spoke at Woodstock. Other interesting historical facts about the area will come to light like the Armstrong AirField where Charles Linburg landed. Three authors came from the area and residents will learn more about the history of the churches and businesses.

Once the exhibit wraps up at the Library, the pan-
